#### FROM WORLD RESPECTED ORGANISATIONS



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Illegal betting is THE major competitor to tote operators

Illegal betting is big and growing in all regions, not only Asia

Illegal betting undermines the integrity of horse racing and other sports

Illegal betting causes far greater gambling harm than regulated betting

Illegal betting is operated by and funds organised crime

Tote operators must differentiate themselves from the illegal betting market and be perceived as part of the solution for the problems caused by illegal betting



#### THE STATE OF ILLEGAL BETTING

The State of Illegal Betting report (2022) is intended to

- inform stakeholders about the state of illegal betting;
- assess recent changes in illegal betting markets; and
- predict how they will change further in the coming years.





## <sup>1</sup> THE STATE OF ILLEGAL BETTING IS AN ANALYSIS OF OVER 20,000 ONLINE BETTING WEBSITES

20,000 websites categorised as "Gambling" and "Gambling > Sports Betting" by leading web analytics tool SimilarWeb

Selection & filtering

Filtering these websites with average monthly visits >1 million; and removing websites which did not offer sports betting;

Analysis

Analysis of the websites for licensing and regulatory status, web traffic data, server locations, sports betting products offered, and customer information

## ILLEGAL BETTING IS GROWING MUCH FASTER THAN LEGAL BETTING ONLINE FROM 2019 TO 2021

Strict licence conditions and gambling regulations on the number of sports and types of bets

Operators have better prices, product, promotions, less operating costs, no regulation



### ANALYSIS OF BETTING LICENSES SHOWS LICENSED AND REGULATED BETTING OPERATORS ARE A MINORITY

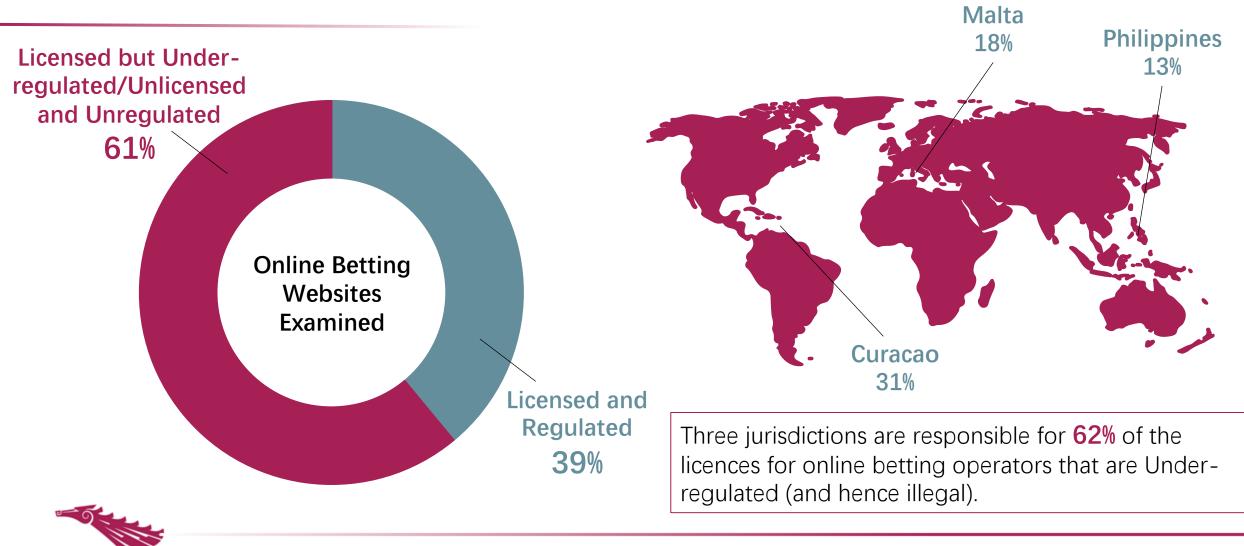
• Does the regulator license and regulate gambling and betting offered only to persons located in that jurisdiction? The focus is on where the point of sale takes place and whether the operator has a licence in that location

Licensed and Regulated	Licensed but Under-	Unlicensed and

• Because online betting is a transnational globalised business, operators with multiple licences from different jurisdictions were classified according to their strongest licence

# **ILLEGAL BETTING IS WIDESPREAD IN ASIA**

China

- Cross-border illegal betting causes CNY 1 trillion (USD 145 billion) capital outflow each year
- Estimated 85% of Chinese sports betting market is illegal, worth CNY 3.9 trillion yuan (US\$ 600 billion) a year – accounts for majority of global illegal market (~USD\$750 billion to 1 trillion)

Malaysia

- Illegal lottery operations are estimated to have recorded around MYR 15 billion (USD 3.4 billion) a year in revenue
- Illegal betting syndicates cause the government to lose MYR 3 billion (USD 670 million) in tax revenue annually



#### Thailand

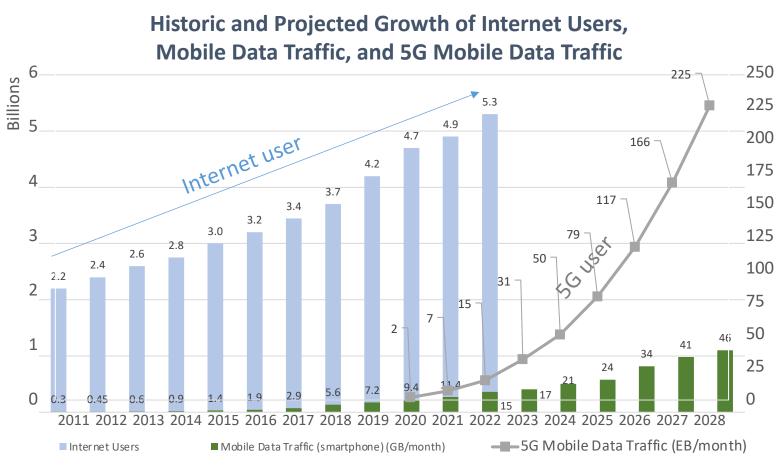
- Total money in circulation within the illegal gambling industry is around THB 436 billion (USD 13 billion)
- Gross gaming revenue of (illegal) online gambling alone is THB 100 billion (USD 3 billion)

#### ILLEGAL BETTING HAS GROWN IN PARALLEL WITH INTERNET BASED MOBILE TECHNOLOGY GROWTH



Internet users have more than doubled in the last decade

Mobile data traffic has grown from 2GB per smartphone per month in 2016 to almost 20GB in 2023

5G mobile data traffic will grow from less then 20 exabytes per month in 2022 to over 160 in 2027

Note: One Exabyte (EB) is equal to 1,000 Petabytes or one billion gigabytes (GB)

### **CREDIT AND CRYPTOCURRENCIES ARE THE NORM**



- 70% of licensed websites accept credit cards
- 35% of Unlicensed and Unregulated websites accept credit cards - often blocked by providers and easy to trace by authorities
- Credit betting is the norm in illegal markets, but credit is assigned directly into accounts via agents

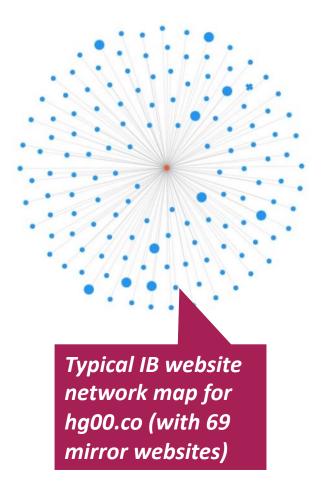


- 24% of betting websites accept cryptocurrencies
- **35%** accepting cryptocurrencies are Under-Regulated or Unregulated (illegal), with Curaçao the most prevalent license
- A third of websites can be funded indirectly by cryptocurrencies, by accepting payment apps (e.g. PayPal, Skrill, Neteller) that accept cryptocurrencies



## UNLICENSED BETTING OPERATORS ARE USING MIRROR WEBSITES TO AVOID DETECTION BY AUTHORITIES

- 81% of unlicensed betting websites uses mirror websites
- Mirror websites are exact copies of a betting website hosted on a different URL
- They provide redundancy and business continuity, and to avoid detection by authorities – If a URL is shut down or blocked by authorities, customers can quickly be migrated to an alternate URL
- Huangguan (皇冠), one of the world's largest Unlicensed and Unregulated sports betting operators, has no fixed domain but customers access websites via mirror URLs provided by agents and/or referral websites





## <sup>1</sup> IT HAS NEVER BEEN EASIER TO SET UP AN ONLINE BETTING WEBSITE

- Betting websites need functions such as odds-making and risk management, live sports data feeds, live video streaming, customer relationship management, technical support and payment processing.
- Software is typically licensed from business to business (B2B) providers
- At least 73% of betting websites use one or more third-party software providers

A problem is when betting suppliers service unregulated operators, supporting illegal betting.

Unlicensed and Unregulated operators almost exclusively rely on third party suppliers including data suppliers

## <sup>1</sup> ILLEGAL BETTING & COMPETITION MANIPULATION ARE INTRINSICALLY LINKED



Match-fixers will corrupt low-paid athletes with bribes, then make huge profits by betting on the matches they have fixed at illegal betting sites



### ILLEGAL BETTING CAUSES GAMBLING HARM AT A MUCH HIGHER RATE THAN LICENSED AND REGULATED BETTING

- Globally, there is a growing amount of evidence to show that illegal and offshore betting and rates of gambling disorder are correlated – this is also the case in Australia and New Zealand.
- This is because of the lack of constraints within illegal betting environments, which spur on those with gambling disorder to bet more (amplifying their issues in the process).
- In contrast, onshore betting operators must pay the Problem Gambling Levy and face sanctions if they do not proactively take measures against problem gambling.
- At the same time, evidence suggests that those with gambling disorders are disproportionately afflicted by a variety of other social ills.

# <sup>1</sup> ILLEGAL BETTING IS A MAJOR REVENUE SOURCE FOR ORGANISED CRIME GROUPS

Criminals have and will continue to exploit regulatory weaknesses / lack of understanding around illegal betting Chinese organised crime highly experienced in casino and online illegal betting, and quick to adapt to changes in environment and exploit vulnerabilities (e.g. cryptocurrencies)

China crackdown on gambling and Macau junkets has pushed these individuals to expand across Southeast Asia and beyond Global awareness of promise of such operators, as money laundering, corruption and other crime typically come in their wake

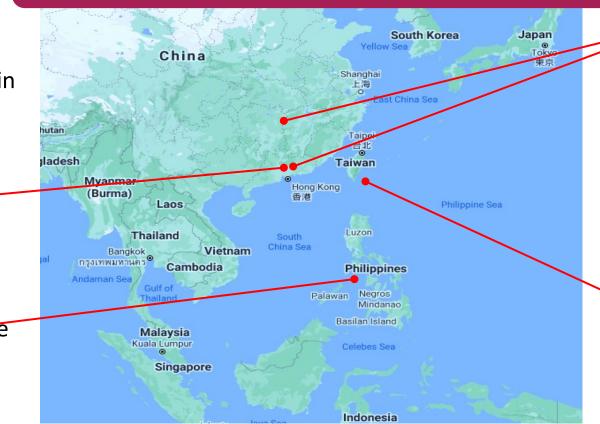

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## GOOD PRACTICES IN ADDRESSING ILLEGAL BETTING: A HANDBOOK FOR RACING AND SPORTS ORGANISATIONS TO UPHOLD INTEGRITY

- 1. Gambling regulators should adopt the Macolin Convention definition in national gambling regulation;
- 2. Betting operators should be licensed and approved by the specific jurisdiction in which they operate, rather than by offshore jurisdictions;
- 3. Taxation authorities should prevent betting and gambling being used to shelter tax evasion;
- 4. Internet Service Providers (ISPs) should be required to block access to illegal betting websites;
- 5. Financial institutions should lobby operators to block transactions to and from illegal betting merchants;
- 6. Licensed betting operators should commit to 100% of their revenues to come from regulated markets, and to exit markets in which there are no viable paths to regulation.

### 6. LICENSED BETTING OPERATORS SHOULD COMMIT TO 100% OF THEIR REVENUES TO COME FROM REGULATED MARKETS, AND TO EXIT MARKETS IN WHICH THERE ARE NO VIABLE PATHS TO REGULATION

Licensed betting operators should commit – as part of their license application process –

To take all reasonable steps to NOT accept wagers from customers in jurisdictions where they do not hold a local license

Implement responsible gambling programs and have self-exclusion policies in place Be seen to act in a responsible fashion to distinguish themselves from illegal operators

Contributing financially to research, education and treatment of problem gamblers

Taking active steps to ban minors and vulnerable people Globally, sports, racing and the legal betting industry must work together to bring pressure to bear on betting tax havens and jurisdictions which act irresponsibly and enable illegal and grey-area betting



### VARIABLE BETTING DUTY AND THE IMPACT ON TURNOVER, ILLEGAL BETTING AND TAXATION REVENUES

- Higher betting tax leads to pressure for a higher takeout rate (for tote operators) and a higher theoretical margin (for fixed odds bookmakers).
- This leads to higher prices passed on to customers, leading more to migrate to illegal betting markets where prices are better value because operators and customers do not pay any tax.
- The consequence is decreased legal betting and decreased taxation.



#### **BETTING DUTY (TAX) VARIES GLOBALLY BETWEEN 6% TO 75%**

- The highest rate of Betting Duty is in Hong Kong, at 75% of GGR.
  - USA (states) 6 to 51%
- The median rate of Betting Duty is in France, at 37.7% of GGR.
  - Australia (states) 15%
  - Sweden increasing from 18 to 22%
- The lowest rate of Betting Duty is in South Africa, at 6% of GGR.



#### BETTING DUTY (TAX) HAS SOME CORRELATION TO ILLEGAL BETTING MARKET LEVELS, BUT HARD TO MEASURE AND OTHER VARIABLES

Country / Jurisdiction	Betting Duty / Takeout Rate	Illegal Market Size (per annum)	Illegal Market by head of population
Hong Kong	72.5% to 75% (racing) / 17.5% to 25%	USD 1.91 billion (margin)	USD 257

- The huge variations in betting tax lead to distortions in the betting market as consumers go to illegal markets where prices are better.
- Government policies are contradictory as they seek to limit the negative impact of gambling on society by imposing higher rates of betting tax, but also want taxation income as part of a broad based tax system.
- Higher betting tax leads to increased theoretical margin to betting odds, consequent increases to the take out rate of the operator, increased prices for the customer, and drives customers to illegal betting markets.



#### **RECOMMENDATIONS FOR TOTE OPERATORS**

- 1. Clearly differentiate yourselves from the illegal market and be part of efforts to combat illegal betting.
- 2. Support integrity in horse racing and other sports as a core part of the relationship between betting and those sports.
- Lobby government and gambling regulators for reasonable and stable betting tax rate to channel demand to the legal betting sector and allow licensed betting operators to effectively compete with the illegal market.



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
